Blog: (n.) Short for *Web log*, a [blog](#) is a Web page that serves as a publicly accessible personal journal for an individual.

Diana Forest will present the program "What Is a Blog?" and other related topics. We are meeting at the church so she can go on line to use the internet. She has asked that you to send her questions or internet problems ahead of time by emailing her <dj_forest@comcast.net>. This will make it easier for her to prepare a more meaningful program.

Our Denver Apple Pi website is going to become more useful to its members. Web space will be available to members to introduce a small business or talents and to advertise services.

The suggested size of the text is no more than 500 words and a small logo or avatar (your photo or likeness) can be included. This will be our "blog" page. Members will log in and post their ad and picture. Training will be offered at our October 16, 2007 meeting at the church where access to the internet is available.

Instructions will be emailed to members along with their password. It is assumed that this password is to be given out **ONLY** to the member. All ads will be previewed and okayed by one of the board members. Your ad can also include a link to your website if you have one. Depending on how well this experiment goes, we may open up the Blog for comments and stories around your use of the services listed or other offerings from this club. Other offerings that may eventually be added could include

To prevent this, call the following number *from your cell phone*: 888-382-1222. This is the number for the national “do not call” list. This will block your phone for 5 years. It will take 20 seconds to do this.

NEOOFFICE VS OFFICE

In the September issue of The Seed, a lengthy article on the free download OpenOffice was presented. Another suite of office software, NeoOffice, is also available as a free download and may be equal to or better than Open Office. The web has several sites where you can review comments on one versus the other:

Some comments from blogs:

- ❖ OpenOffice is nice but slow as heck. I went back to NeoOffice for that reason.
- ❖ I use NeoOffice because I had trouble printing and using some fonts with OpenOffice.
- ❖ NeoOffice, as I concluded last week, does not require X11; it runs natively in OS X.
- ❖ When you download and first install NeoOffice, the saving formats are in Open Document format. If you are doing a great deal of work with others who are using MS Office, you may find it easier to set up NeoOffice to save in MS formats automatically. Go to the [Tools] Menu, select [Options], then select [Load/Save]. Click the triangle to reveal the rest of the options for the Load/Save section, then click on [General]. The bottom middle area shows the default file formats. From those pop-up menus, you can set your documents to save by default in MS Office formats.
- ❖ One of the really nice features is the "Export to PDF" function ([File menu] > [Export as PDF]), which produces much smaller PDFs than MS Word does with equal or better quality.
- ❖ Even better, the price can't be beat – free!
- ❖ Who needs M\$ Office?
- ❖ NeoOffice's wordprocessor is a boon. The feature I like the most is its predictive text entry which NeoOffice calls “Word Completion”. NeoOffice can automatically suggest words as you begin typing them; hitting the [Return] key accepts the suggestion, or you can ignore it, and keep typing – which ever you feel more comfortable with.

You can also drag from the Dock (out to your desktop or to an open window) by first holding the Command key, then dragging. Want to make an alias of a Dock icon? Just hold Command-Option and drag the docked file to the window you want, and it creates an alias. In fact, most of the things you can do within a window (copying a file, creating an alias, etc.) can be done from the Dock, as long as you start with the Command key.

MAILING DVDs

Tony Pizza made DVDs from his 50th high school reunion photos and needed to mail them to his classmates. He says:

Now that I {had} created the DVD I had to make 75 copies and mail them. I decided that instead of plastic "jewel cases," I would use Tyvek sleeves. [Made from genuine DuPont Tyvek, the Tyvek sleeve holds 1 CD in the ultimate archival material with a 4" circle Mylar window for easy label viewing. Save for DVD storage too! 4-7/8 x 5 inches exclusive of flap. Available online or from office supply stores.] I figured if Netflix can send millions of DVDs like that, it would work. I cut a protective insert from a piece of card stock (110 pound paper). The dimensions were 4 3/4" X 10 3/4", which when folded in half, then you fit in the sleeve. The DVD went in the middle. Then I mailed them in a 6" X 9" envelope, for 58 cents each. I didn't have any reports of damaged disks. If

GOOGLE EARTH NEW FEATURE

When we told you about the new Google Sky feature in the latest version of Google Earth, what we didn't know is that this version actually contains an Easter Egg, of sorts. It turns out that if you press Ctrl-Alt-A on a PC, or Command-Option-A on a Mac (making sure that the focus is not in a text field), you'll enable a flight simulator. It's not particularly well hidden, and once you've successfully flown one of the planes it actually shows up as an option on the Tools menu in Google Earth, but still it's a pretty cool feature.

In fact, it's one of those "why didn't we think of it?" types of features. It seems obvious to use Google's satellite imagery and on-the-fly (sorry for the pun) map loading technology in the context of a flight sim.

So, what is the experience like? Better than you might expect. You get the choice of flying either an F16 jet or an SR 22 prop plane, with the obvious speed difference. The controls are pretty delicate and difficult to master, particularly on a keyboard. It appears that Google Earth actually supports joystick input for the flight sim mode, although we haven't had a chance to try it yet. Most of the world's biggest airports are represented in the list of starting spots, but you can also choose a start at the current position you were viewing in Google Earth before invoking the flight sim mode.
