### OS X 10.11 EL CAPITAN IS HERE

At our November 17, 2015, meeting, Jeff Gamet, Managing Editor of <u>The Mac Observer</u> will tell us about the newest operating system upgrade: El Capitan, OS X version 10.11. An article written by Bob LeVitus also of The Mac Observer says, "When you do decide to upgrade, you should first make two complete backups of your boot disk. Next, test the disks before you upgrade, just in case." See his entire article: <u>Read This Before Installing El Capitan</u>.

As a heads-up prior to this meeting, here are some highlights of El Capitan:

**Improved Spotlight** (Command+SpaceBar) search terms for more "transient" data such as weather, sports scores, YouTube and emails you have visited previously using normal syntax, such as "email from lottery winning notice."

**Mail updates**, including full screen, tab bar to compose multiple messages, proactive data detection for events, contacts and flights. Data bars appear at top of email so you can perform a relevant action from the "proactive data."

**Notes** now has formatting features similar to Pages. From <a href="9to5 Mac">9to5 Mac</a>: Crucially, once you upgrade Notes to use iCloud Drive, El Capitan is required to sync with iOS 9. Yosemite users have no choice but to upgrade their Macs if they want to retain cross-platform harmony. Also keep in mind that

sketches can only be created and edited on iOS 9 devices — they are only viewable on OS X.

El Capitan performance improvements "are under the hood," making your Mac feels zippier overall, with many apps launching faster and feeling snappier. Metal, a graphics high-performance drawing framework should provide better frame rates and transitions across the OS along with 4x faster PDF rendering and 1.4x faster launching.

Website: "What is your mother's maiden name?"
You write: "The
Gettysburg Address"

(Only you know what you entered; it doesn't have to be true!).


Website: What is your favorite sports team? You write: **The Denver Broncos. Red trees grow very tall.** (This non sequitur should keep the hackers and snoopers out. Just make sure you can remember it exactly, and use this security question on multiple sites.)

# WHY YOU MAY WANT TO DISABLE WI-FI ASSIST ON iOS 9

When a user upgrades to iOS 9, Apple enables Wi-Fi Assist by default without providing any prompts or warnings that it has done so. Using this feature under the wrong circumstances can produce productivity and financial consequences, including high data costs. Thankfully, it's easy to disable Wi-Fi Assist if you decide it's not beneficial for your situation.

While users with larger data caps may not mind, those stuck on more limited data plans probably don't want their cellular data connection kicking in without warning in a scenario in which a Wi-Fi signal, even a poor one, is still available.



To disable Wi-Fi Assist in iOS 9, head to **Settings > Cellular**. The contents of this menu will depend on your carrier and the number of apps installed on your <u>iPhone</u>, but scroll all the way down to the bottom of the page and you'll see an entry for Wi-Fi Assist. Tap the toggle switch to set it to **Off** (white). Your device will simply behave as it did prior to the iOS 9 upgrade and will only switch to a cellular data connection when it completely loses its Wi-Fi signal.

# PREVIEW, A VERY USEFUL PROGRAM



Mac Basics: Preview app views and edits images and PDFs.


You can open a PDF document or an image using Preview by double-clicking the image, or by dragging and dropping the image on the Preview icon in the Finder or Dock.

You don't have to use Adobe Reader. To make Preview your default, see below. Also, you can open MS Office documents: Word, PowerPoint, Excel—you can't edit them, but you can read, search and print them.

To make Preview your default:

Select a PDF file so that it's highlighted. Then press the Apple/Command key along with the letter "i" key, or choose Get Info from the File Menu.

Where it says "Open with," select Preview.
Then, where you see the "Change All" button, click.
After that, PDF will open with Preview. You can repeat the process and restore Adobe Reader as the default app.

#### **EMOJIS ON OUR MACS**



**Definition:** *emoji* literally means

"picture" (e) +
"character" (moji)

**Origin:** In 1998 or 1999, Shigetaka Kurita created *emojis* during his time at Docomo, a Japanese mobile communications service.

## History of iPhone emojis:

After introducing the iPhone in the United States on June 29, 2007, Steve Jobs traveled to Japan to try to get iPhone introduced into Japan's lucrative market. In 2007, Japan had an 80-million-user mobile market. Japan's cellphone technology was so much more advanced than the expensive iPhone (~\$400 in 2007), there was little interest by Japanese companies to include the iPhone in their choice of devices.


Steve Jobs then went to Softbank, the 5<sup>th</sup> largest Japanese mobile operator at the time, and they were a little more forgiving. Softbank would negotiate a deal taking a large cut of the profits (more than

Steve Jobs wanted) but only if the iPhone to be introduced in Japan included emoji.

Although several people worked on Apple's emoji character set before the iPhone 3GS launched in Japan in 2009, the most prolific was Willem Van Lancker, then an intern, who created 400 of the original 500 characters.

Emojis are now available on our Macs as well as on our iPhones and iPads. If you are using El Capitan, the keystroke **Control+Command+Space** will bring up the character pallet. Double click or drag the emogi to where you want it to show in your text.

Another way to access emojis is to use your Character Palate. In your text application, go to Edit>Special Characters. Or click the American Flag on your menu bar and click on "Show Character Viewer."



Apple regularly upgrades emojis making changes and omissions. Prepare to re-learn the position of your favorite emojis as they have all changed. Emojis sent to Android or Windows devices may not appear the same as on Apple devices.
