

OVERSIGHT – WHO WANTS TO SEE AND HEAR YOU?

OverSight is free software that will let you know what apps you have on your computer that can see and hear you. OverSight monitors your mac's mic and webcam alerting the user when the internal mic is activated or whenever a process accesses the webcam. Names of some of the malware seeking to spy on you include OSX/FruitFly, OSX/Crisis, and OSX/Mokes. Also, according to OverSight's website, some malware can piggyback into existing sessions (FaceTime, Skype, Google Hangouts, etc.) and record both audio and video without fear of detection.

OverSight is one app available from Objective-See. Go to the website below and select from Products, Malware, Blog, and About to read about their services.

From the blog on Objective-See, the following was noted:

"Looks like somebody on the 'dark web' is offering 'Ransomware as a Service'...that's designed to infect Macs!"

On the malware portion, you can look at BUT DO NOT CLICK ON many malware applications out there waiting for us to make one unknowing click. Your editor made one unknowing click several years ago on "Genieo," a bad mistake thinking I was just updating my Safari browser.

Additionally, on the OverSight website is "About" where you can read about the creator of these apps and also read some of his published research on security for Macs.

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iPhone X Face and Fingerprint ID

In the initial setup on your new iPhone X, you can choose to use photo ID that is taken using your new iPhone X and encrypted into complex digital key. No photo or fingerprint exists for you to view as such. The 3D mapping camera takes image of your face to create a digital, complex key (password) that will open your device upon recognizing your photo.

This ID system doesn't contain your photo on your phone. So if someone were to recover your iPhone X that uses Photo ID, they can't open it. The Photo files on your iPhone X likely have many photos of you, but the ID process doesn't have one nor does it use one from your photo files.

Face ID is the fast option to open iPhone X but not the only one. In the initial setup of the phone, you can choose to use a passcode entry just like any other regular iPhone. To wake your new iPhone X not using Photo ID, raise to wake, tap the screen (or press the power button), then swipe up from the bottom of the screen. The iPhone X has many new features and ways to use them; you will need to learn new taps and swipes before you can operate it.

You may have heard that some users have complained that the iPhone X's screen becomes unresponsive when they step outside into the cold. Apple is planning to fix the problem in an upcoming software update. Here is a comment from an iPhone 6 user explaining saying this "cold" complex isn't unique to iPhone X:

...I have an iPhone 6 and it routinely shuts itself off when I take it out of my pocket in temps below freezing. Sometimes it will show a dead battery (which was previously fully charged) and sometimes it just won't respond. When it does this, warming it up will not help unless it's plugged in. Plugging it in will perform a system reset and then it will come back.

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COMFORTING NEWS

Apple has released iOS 11.1.1. You can download it on all iPhones and iPads overthe-air by going to Settings --> General --> Software Update.

iOS 11.1. fixes an issue with keyboard autocorrect that causes "i" to autocorrect to A[?]. It also fixes an issue where "Hey Siri" stops working.

ZEUS PANDA: A PHISHING SCAM TO ACCESS YOUR FINANCIAL INSTITUTION

Keep your financial information secure. Avoid the banking malware called Zeus Panda. Type the bank's web address directly into your browser to make sure you're not headed to a malicious site. Do NOT CLICK ON LINKS to financial institutions through an online search

Typically, malicious Word documents are sent through phishing emails. You should never download PDF, Word or Excel files attached to unsolicited emails, to begin with. By following these instructions, you're enabling macros that are embedded in the Word document. This is where the victim's gadget is infected with the banking malware, Zeus Panda. It's designed to help criminals behind the attack steal your banking and other critical credentials.

With Zeus Panda, the Word document is delivered through a malicious site that comes up via online search. If you do open one of these documents and it says that you need to turn on macros, close the file and delete it immediately.

Your best bet is to turn off the ability to use macros in Word. Make sure you're using strong antivirus software on all of your gadgets. And keep them up-to-date for the best protection. This is the best way to keep your device from being infected with malware.
