AT THE BOARD MEETING

The DAPI Board of Directors at the Nov. 3, 2008 meeting discussed the possibility of purchasing a wireless internet phone modem for use at our meetings at the Consolidated Water Company.

Practically all of the cell phone providers, Verizon, AT&T, Sprint, etc., have the ability to add a modem for a computer. This would enable the club to have internet capabilities at the meetings and the board thinks that would enhance our meetings to a great extent. Cost is a major factor. The modem would cost about \$50 after a rebate, and the monthly

service charge would be about \$40 to \$60, depending on the amount that the modem would be used. Extending a member's phone service for a two year contract is standard. This equates to a yearly cost in the range of \$530 to \$780, depending on usage.

This is a substantial cost and the present monthly income would not support this endeavor. There are many ways to meet this cost: benevolence on a part of a club member, establishing a fund open for contributions from the membership, and raising the dues. Presently the club is placing three items on ebay, the club G4 laptop, the older video projector and the Samsung B/W printer. The sale of these items could possibly offset part of the first year's cost.

We are publishing this in *The Seed* to get members' opinions. Please contact any board member about any of your ideas.

DIGITAL TV BROADCAST TRANSITION

From the FCC and Comcast

Due to the nation's changeover to digital broadcasting, after February 17, 2009 a TV with only an analog broadcast tuner will require a converter box to receive broadcast channels over-the-air.

As a Comcast cable customer, this switch should not affect you, unless you have such a TV that is not connected to cable.

If you do, visit www.dtv2009.gov or call 1-888-DTV-2009 for information on subsidized converter coupons or contact www.dtv.gov or Comcast (at www.comcast.com/dtv or 1-800-COMCAST) to learn about your options.

The change will not affect how your analog TV functions with low power broadcast channels, gaming consoles, VCRs or DVD players.



MAKING THE TRACKPAD INACTIVE

From Finder Help

If you're using a portable computer, you can set it to ignore the trackpad while you're typing or when you have a mouse connected.

To make your trackpad inactive:

- Choose Apple menu > System Preferences, click Keyboard & Mouse, and then click Trackpad.
- Open the Trackpad pane of Keyboard & Mouse preferences. Set trackpad options:
 1. Ignore accidental trackpad input: Makes the computer ignore the trackpad while you type.
 2. Ignore trackpad when mouse is present:

Makes the computer ignore the trackpad when a mouse is connected.

If you're using a non-Apple mouse, the driver software that came with your mouse may prevent these options from working as expected. See the documentation that came with your mouse for more information.

WHY YOUR CLOCK RADIO IS ALL ABUZZ ABOUT YOUR IPHONE

Have you ever put your iPhone (or other phone) near a clock radio or answering machine, and heard a loud staccato buzzing? If so, you're not alone. Reports of iPhones making consumer electronics buzz and click are common, but why does it happen? We talked to a couple of RF experts to learn what's going wrong, and what you can do about it.

In part, this is what the above reference says:

Consumer electronics, like your clock radio, your headset, the recording device you're on, all those receivers are manufactured under what's called Part 15 of the FCC rules. And Part 15 basically says, look, as a national policy, we want to encourage low-cost, relatively high-quality consumer electronics. And as a trade-off, under Part 15, it means that you as a buyer of a Part 15 device, [in other words, your clock radio; in fact if you flip it over I guarantee you if the tag hasn't fallen off, there's something there that says "this device manufactured under Part 15"], essentially it says that you have to accept any interference that comes into it. That's your trade-off, you get cheap consumer electronics, but you have to live with the interference that might come it.

The FCC would not comment on the record for this piece, and Apple Computer did not return numerous phone calls requesting an interview for comment. If you absolutely have to have an iPhone, or another noisy GSM cell phone, I'll leave you with this piece of advice from Jonathan Kramer.

Kramer*: Buy extremely expensive, extremely well-made devices, that may be made under Part 15, but actually do reject outside world signals.

**Jonathan L. Kramer, a former Motorola RF engineer who later went on to become an attorney, and is now the principal attorney at Kramer Telecomm Law Firm, PC, is no stranger to this type of interference either.*

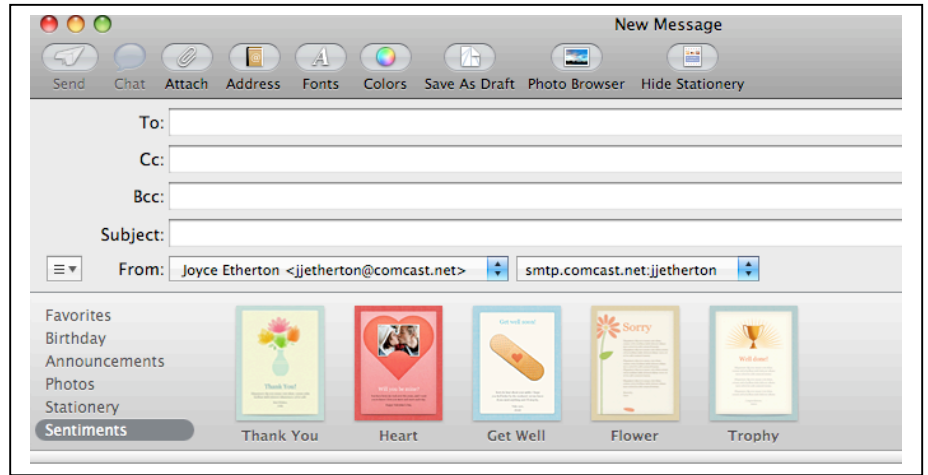

In OS X Leopard, in Mail, click “new message” to bring up the above window. At the top under “new message, note the “Hide Stationery” window. (This window will say “Show Stationery” before you click on it—after you click on it, it will say “Hide Stationery” as in photo above). You can select from several stationery styles, including “photos” and using the “Photo Browser” icon, you can drag your iPhoto selection into your stationery and have a personalized card.



EL GATO EYETV HYBRID REVIEW

... I purchased the EyeTV Hybrid, along with an inexpensive antenna that supported both digital and analog broadcast signals. The EyeTV Hybrid itself is a small, aluminum stick with a USB port at one end and a full-size coaxial plug on the other end. You plug the USB port into your Mac (Intel Mac definitely recommended), and the other end into your antenna or analog cable connection. EyeTV Hybrid comes with a composite video and S-Video breakout cable to connect a set-top box or video game console.

EyeTV also receives free over-the-air (OTA) HDTV, Clear QAM, and traditional analog TV. When you plug everything in and install the software, you need to allow the EyeTV 3 software several minutes to scan the airwaves for analog broadcasting, and then again for digital broadcasting.

After this was accomplished, I was able to instantly begin watching live broadcast HDTV on the iMac. The image quality looked fantastic on the iMac's widescreen monitor, and I was especially surprised by the HD video quality. The iMac was truly working as a LCD television. I was also impressed by the quality of the EyeTV 3 software. It was truly “Mac-like” in all regards.

USING STATIONERY IN LEOPARD MAIL

In Leopard Mail, you can choose from more than 30 professionally designed stationery templates that make a virtual keepsake out of every email you send. Templates feature coordinated layouts, fonts, colors, and drag-and-drop photo

The software gave me a list of channels with the strongest, clearest signal, but it was also possible to manually click through unlisted channels that suffered poor reception. I was able to tune four crystal clear HD stations, along with 13 other analog channels of varying quality. After years of having cable, it seemed odd to move the antenna around for better reception. For that particular night, I was satisfied to have the three HD channels.

As channels convert to DTV by 2009, reception should improve. Of course, a connection via cable would be best, but after initial hardware costs, it's nice to have "free" TV again. Also, I am going to do some research and buy a really good antenna. I'll set everything up in the office and let you know how it goes over the next few months. I'm also going to experiment with connecting the Mac to the cable with the EyeTV Hybrid.

Now my iMac is an HDTV and DVR in one. The EyeTV Hybrid works way better than I expected, and I am happy with it. This is a great solution for using a Mac as TV in a guest room, a dorm room, an office, or even a living room in a cramped apartment.

EyeTV hybrid also works as a pass-through device, so you can connect a VCR and convert all your old VHS tapes to digital format for editing, archiving, and burning to DVD.
