APPCLEANER

AppCleaner is a free application that will uninstall previously installed applications properly. When you download an application, small files that help application work are the distributed throughout your hard drive. AppCleaner finds these small files and, along with the application, safely deletes them. So you can clean up thoroughly rather than leaving files that just clutter up your computer and use Hard Drive space unnecessarily.

- Uses drag and drop interface
- Deletes an app properly when you move it to trash
- Protects your favorite apps from being deleted accidentally
- Stores deleted files in a history log

Requires Mac OS 10.4 or later

RIGHT-CLICK YOUR MOUSE

The easiest way to right-click is to hold down the ctrl key before you click your mouse button. This works on any Mac!

Many Mac users don't know that Macs are as right-click savvy as Windows computers. This misunderstanding is partly Apple's fault. While Macs have been long able to right click, they shipped with a single-button mouse until 2005. Before that, it was necessary to purchase a third-party mouse with two buttons (or use the Control key, described below).

All desktop Macs now ship with Apple's Mighty Mouse (which is multi-click capable), but by default the Mighty Mouse is configured for single-button clicking. Likewise, the trackpads on the past few generations of Apple notebooks have the ability to right-tap, emulating the right-click of a regular mouse. However, by default this is also not activated.

Here's how to configure the Mighty Mouse for right-clicking (or Secondary Clicking, as Apple calls it):

1. Open System Preferences (by clicking on the the Apple icon in the upper left corner of the screen, then choosing System Preferences)._2. Click Keyboard & Mouse to open its preference pane._3 Click the Mouse tab._4 Choose which button you want to assign to use for right clicking (again, called Secondary Click here). I suggest using the, uh, right key to right click.

Now you can use your Mighty Mouse to access unique contextual menus for each application.

If you have a recent Apple notebook, you can configure the trackpad to recognize a right click:

1. Open System Preferences (by clicking on the the Apple icon in the upper left corner of the screen, then choosing System Preferences)._2. Click Keyboard & Mouse to open its preference pane._3 Click the Trackpad tab._4 Click the checkbox "For secondary clicks, place two fingers on the trackpad then click the button".

Now you can use your MacBook, MacBook Pro, and late model PowerBook's trackpad to access unique contextual menus for each application.

As mentioned above, you can also hold down your Mac's **Control** key while clicking with your mouse or trackpad to access the right-click contextual menu. The **Control** key is labeled **ctrl** on most Apple notebooks.



WHY USE BEAN? – A FREE WORD PROCESSOR FOR OS X http://www.bean-osx.com/Bean.html

Bean is lean, fast, and uncluttered wordprocessor. Bean is not a replacement for MS Word. It doesn't do footnotes or pre-defined styles and is only partially compatible with Word's file formats. What it does do:

- a live word count
- a Get Info

• an Inspector panel with lots of sliders

• date-stamped backups

• autosaving panel for in-depth statistics

• a zoom-slider to easily change the view scale

• a page layout mode

• an alternate colors option (e.g., white text on blue)

• selection of text by text style, paragraph style, color, etc.

• a floating windows option (like Stickies has)

• find panel allows regular expressions (pattern matching)

• all of Cocoa's good stuff (dictionary, word completion, etc.)

If you get depressed at the thought of firing up MS Word or OpenOffice, try Bean.

If you use Text Edit but have to jump through hoops just to get a word count, try Bean.

If you desire a simple, beautiful writing environment, try Bean.

REALLY EMPTY THE TRASH

It's simple to delete unwanted files using Mac OS X Leopard: Just drag the files onto the Trash icon in the Dock (or select them and type Command-Delete), then choose Empty Trash in the Finder menu (or type Command-Shift-Delete). Alternately, you can double-click on the Trash icon to open it, then click on the Empty button.

Emptying the Trash in this manner clears room on your Mac for other files. But the data hasn't actually been removed from your computer — the space occupied by these files is simply available to be overwritten by new information. Until this happens, it may be possible for someone to use data recovery software to restore your "deleted" files. And if this information is sensitive or confidential, it could potentially end up in the wrong hands.

That's why Mac OS X Leopard provides another option for deleting data: the Secure Empty Trash command. Meant for those occasions when you want to permanently and immediately delete files, Secure Empty Trash overwrites your data with digital gibberish, ensuring that your deleted data is gone for good. It may take a few moments longer, but it's a good choice for deleting data you're sure you don't need — and don't want anyone else to see.

To delete your Trash securely, go to the Finder menu and select Secure Empty Trash. A pop-up will ask you to confirm that you want to permanently erase the items in the Trash. Click OK, and these files will be gone forever.



MANIPULATING YOUR OWN DIGITAL PHOTOS Joyce Etherton

Manipulating digital photos these days is far easier for non-experts, says D'Aartagnan Fischer in his article in <u>Computer Edge</u> "Photo Manipulation in the 21st Century." The added beauty is that this can all be done over the web, so it doesn't matter what type of computer you use—there is no software to load.

Below are listed fun photo sites. Shown are just a few of the many options available you have for manipulating your digital photos. Do you want to put your face on Mount Rushmore, add your face to a pancake, do the famous Andy Warhol effect to your picture, put your picture onto playing cards or dollar bills, and even add "speech bubbles" to your own pictures? Most of these sites provide simple point-and-click instructions and the program on the other side of the web.

Photofunia – put your favorite photo into posters such as Mona Lisa

<u>GlassGiant</u> — Here's your pancake "miracle" or maybe a Harlequinlike romance novel cover. <u>Flickr Toys</u> —Do a Marilyn Monroe-type Andy Warhol effect with your photo.

<u>Festisite</u> — Upload a photo and generate personalized playing cards online

<u>ImageChef</u> — Choose templates to customize and send in emails.

<u>Kyolo</u> — "The easiest way to create speech bubbles on photos."

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KEYBOARD AND MOUSE SHOWN IN APPLE MENU "PREFERENCES"

Shortcut keys are on all Macintosh computers. They are preset and you can find out all about your choices in Apple Preferences and select "Keyboard & Mouse." One can always use the mouse to navigate—on the Mac it seems there are always two ways, and probably more ways, to get to where you need to go. Consider some mouse operations you use frequently and consider making a keyboard shortcut your alternative-and a more convenient one at that. If you tend to forget your magic keystroke shortcut, make a cheat sheet and paste it on your screen so you can remember.

Below is the first portion of the preferences for keyboard & mouse. Note that it is really easy to change a shortcut: double-click the shortcut and hold down the new keys.

If you don't know what some of the funny looking shortcut symbols are, hover over them with the mouse and they will be revealed. You could even make a cheat sheet of them.

Additional shortcuts are shown by moving the the blue slider down.

• Use the displayed arrow keys to move around the chapel; don't forget to look at the ceiling. Go up and down and all around. You can look at the ceiling


- from various alcoves and aisles.
