ODD USES FOR THE iPad

When personal computers first came out, some people dismissed them as a fad like citizen band radios. Of course, personal computers never faded away because people found them so versatile in doing everything from playing games to word processing to predicting the winners of horse races.

Now the iPad is going through this same stage. After critics dismissed the iPad as a useless device that nobody needed, people have found all sorts of reasons to use an iPad in often surprising ways, just like the early days of personal computers.

In Japan, the Japanese Sumo Association has given sumo wrestlers an iPad to help them stay in contact by e-mail. The reason is because the hands and fingers of sumo wrestlers are too big to use an ordinary mobile phone comfortably, but the much larger size of the iPad is perfect for the bigger fingertips of sumo wrestlers.

A company called Brabus specializes in customizing the Mercedes-Benz for its wealthy clients. Its latest custom package includes using a Mac mini and a wireless keyboard to keep back-seat passengers amused, along with two iPads embedded in the seats to control the car's audio, navigation, and phone systems.

Even surgeons are finding that the iPad can help them view enhanced images of the body parts that they're operating on. By carefully wrapping the iPad in plastic to maintain a sterile environment, surgeons can control the iPad even while wearing gloves.

At the Hawaii Preparatory Academy, students are using different apps to turn the iPad into a teaching tool such as Star Walk for astronomy; Molecules for biology; iTranslate for language classes; and SignalScope for physics.

With more people finding unusual and valid uses for the iPad every day, the iPad's versatility and flexibility has already insured that it will definitely not disappear one day as a fad. Instead, the iPad will likely find its way into your own life in one form or another, whether you know (or like) it or not.

The iPad Effect

Intel recently warned of slowing microprocessor sales, blamed partly because more people are opting for an iPad rather than a netbook or laptop. Even Asustek Computer, the makers of the popular Eee PC, which started the netbook trend, recently announced that the iPad has slowed its netbook sales.

What might drive a stake through netbook sales could be this new iPad case from GearZap. Unlike regular iPad cases that only protect the iPad, GearZap's case also includes a Bluetooth wireless keyboard that lets you type on a physical keyboard. If you don't need this keyboard, just tuck it behind the iPad. This ability to have a real keyboard, or use the virtual keyboard, maintains the iPad's touchscreen advantage over netbooks while also eliminating the major netbook advantage of a physical keyboard. Given the iPad's long 10-hour battery life and GearZap's Bluetooth keyboard, the iPad may suddenly look a lot more attractive than a netbook.

**SELF-PUBLISH ELECTRONIC BOOK**

If you've thought about self-publishing an electronic book through Apple's iBooks store, you must first create a file in the ePub file format, which is the open standard for electronic books. One way to do this is through Adobe's InDesign desktop publishing program. A second way is through Pages, the word processor in Apple's iWork suite.

By downloading the latest 4.04 update to Pages, you can now export your Pages documents to ePub format. Now you can create and market your electronic book to the world through iBooks.

PING — A SOCIAL NETWORK FOR MUSIC

Apple announced that in less than 48 hours since its launch on Wednesday, 9/3/2010, more than one million users have joined Ping, its new social network for music.

A fully public profile on Ping allows everyone to see what musicians you're following, what albums you're reviewing and what iTunes music you're buying. Conveniently located next to every profile post on Ping is a link to the iTunes store where you can buy the song or album in question. And iTunes isn't cheap; it costs \$1.29 at the click of the mouse.

Because iTunes has so much more information about its users than does Facebook, Twitter or MySpace, many technological experts say that Ping has exponential growth potential. But with the cost factor of Ping versus the free Facebook and Twitter, "exponential" may be pie in the sky in terms of revenue.

To be fair, Ping isn't trying to emulate Facebook or Twitter. Apple CEO Steve Jobs said at the product's unveiling that Ping is "all about the music." But the constantly evolving music interface that is iTunes made a major leap with iTunes 10.

DAPI member Kate Cusack has successfully used the application Screenium until May of this year. In June, using the same method, she got different results. At the Help SIG meeting, below, the problem was studied and as a result Larry Fagan sent an email to Screenium Support for an explanation. This is their reply:



Help Sig Meeting studying Screenium Problem

"We had to change the way the single tracks are captured within the Quicktime file in order to improve performance and reliability. Now if you want to use a file in an application that doesn't support all the tracks within the Quicktime movie, please go to the Screenium Media Library and use the Export feature. Exporting will merge all content and using it in iMovie/ iDVD shouldn't be a problem."

Larry's comment to this was: "I've always wondered what that export button was for, now we know. I will try to test this out this week. I'm also forwarding this to the board members; they were also curious about this seemingly odd behavior."

[Screenium](#) allows you to make live movies of your Mac's screen, capture everything happening on your Desktop, in application programs, including mouse pointer, selections and movements - in real-time! Screenium even grabs live content streamed over the Internet. You can actually capture movie-in-movie: Screenium records your screen just like it is - including ongoing video playback in multiple windows.

REMOVING LINES WHEN FORWARDING E-MAIL

Today I received a neat little e-mail which contained several photos as well as some text here and there. The photos and text of the original e-mail were located on the right side of the e-mail. Just to the left of them were five vertical blue lines, then a space about half an inch wide, and then two vertical green lines. These lines were created when each person in a line of senders sent that e-mail to the next person. The Mail

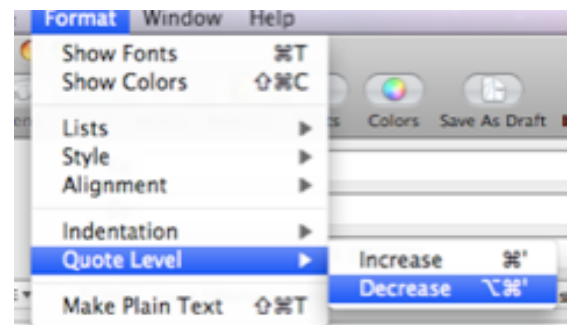
program automatically adds a vertical line when you forward an e-mail.

Well, there were so many lines that it was ugly and distracting, and I didn't want to forward that e-mail with all those lines on it, even though the content was something I thought my friends would appreciate receiving. So I called Apple and spoke with a customer service person about this issue. He went off the line to talk with a Mail expert, and when they returned, the Mail expert took over the call. This person informed me that those lines were inextricably linked to the particular e-mail and that there was nothing that could be done to remove them.

However, he said that I could avoid adding to those lines when I forwarded this or any other e-mail by doing the following: Go into Mail Preferences > Composing > Responding. Uncheck the box in front of "Increase quote level." Leave this box unchecked, and your e-mails will not add a vertical line when you forward e-mail.

Well. I thought I would share this information with Joyce, our editor, so that she could perhaps put something into the newsletter so that everybody else could have this information too. It was when I talked with Joyce about it that I discovered that Joyce knew something the Apple people did not know. Yes, you CAN remove those superfluous lines from an e-mail that you received.

- First, forward the email. — You can't edit an unforwarded email.
- Next, highlight the parts you don't want to forward (including previous recipients) and delete them. Again, highlight the email with the vertical lines.
- Go to Format in the menu and move down to Quote Level>Decrease
- Click on Decrease and the line should disappear. If there are multiple lines, you have to remove each one individually. Note: This is a temperamental format fix. Sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't. Good luck with this! Note also that there is a shortcut keystroke shown: Shift-Command-Apostrophe.
