ADOBE READER UPDATE SCAM

A crucial item is one that's been out for a while - the Adobe Reader (or other Adobe product) scam. You receive an email that your Reader is out of date and has a link to download a new version. The website is fake, the download is fake and all they really want is your credit card number. The real Adobe Reader is FREE.

Only update your Adobe product from within that application. If you start up Adobe Reader and it wants to check if there's a newer version, that's great. Nobody sends update messages to your email.

How to Automatically Restart a Frozen Mac

Q: I have a Mac mini that I use as a home file server, running Snow Leopard. Occasionally, the computer locks up, but since it's headless (or running without a display attached), I don't always realize it. Do you know of any software or web services that could run in the background, and if the machine freezes, alert me via email or text?

A: Some Macs have automatic restarting features built right in to System Preferences. One such preference, which many Macs have, is the ability to restart after a power outage. But another preference that fewer Macs have is the ability to restart after the computer freezes. (Curiously, Apple doesn't say why some Macs can do this and some can't in the Help documentation.)


Mac OS X Lion seems to implement the automatic restart functionality across many different Mac models.

To see if your Mac has this feature, head to System Preferences > Energy Saver, and look at the checkboxes near the bottom of the screen. If your Mac supports the feature, you will see an option for "Restart automatically if the computer freezes." We've noticed that this feature seems to be standard on

most modern Macs running OS X Lion.

With this option checked, the OS will automatically restart the computer if it locks up or becomes unresponsive. It's an especially nifty feature for servers without a display.

Ed. Note: On my iMac running Snow Leopard, this restart option is not available after freezes, only after power outages.

Step 1: Go to the Mac App Store

Step 2: Sign in

Step 3: Look around

Step 4: Buy an App (you need an account to buy)

Step 5: Use your new app (after paying and downloading); be sure to check for updates at the Mac App Store.

If the icon has a red badge with a number on it, there are updates available. (The red badge does not appear on the Mac App Store icon in your Applications folder.)

SIRI IS IN APPLE'S FUTURE

Siri on iPhone 4S lets you use your voice to send messages, schedule meetings, place phone calls, and more. Ask Siri to do things just by talking the way you talk.

With this in mind, Apple is searching for innovative ways to integrate this voice-activated technology into consumerfriendly iOS products including the iPod, iPad and Apple TV. Steve Jobs told biographer Walter Isaacson, "I'd like to create an integrated television set that is completely easy to use...seamlessly synched with all of your devices and with iCloud." As a result, Apple purchased Siri in 2010 which was spun off from SRI, and in October 2011 Apple announced that the iPhone 4S would be using this technology—another of Steve Jobs' visions for the future of Apple.

Siri is not a traditional search engine such as Google. It is only good at very specific types of action-oriented searches, and it ties into dozens of services on the Web to actually help you accomplish what you want to do, from ordering pizza to making a reservation at a nearby restaurant to buying a movie ticket. It is an intelligent agent, and many of its technologies are based on SRI programs the government funded to the tune of about \$200 million years ago. So the

intellectual property alone is worth a ton.

With the voice-activated technology, Siri has enormous potential in business, education, and medical applications. With Wolfram Alpha's extensive knowledge base as a springboard for launching Siri, the far more useful component, if it can be used correctly, is memory. Currently, there is no way to look up past conversations with Siri, and everything Siri does for you is immediately lost if you resume normal activities on the iPhone 4S.

Thanks to iCloud, Apple computers can instantly upload and share important phone data wirelessly, which allows users to store documents, contacts, email and even music in the cloud. If Siri can leverage Apple's free cloud service, Siri could store information about its user, including routine activities they perform with voice-activation and remember it for future recall.

Siri, the virtual assistant, could become incredibly useful if the perfect memory could be integrated with other web libraries. Imagine if WebMD's library of knowledge and Siri were integrated, the system could remember past symptoms and cross reference current symptoms to create a well-informed plan of action. What's more, it could remember users' favorite TV shows, channels and games.

There are reports that a prototype curved-glass iPod nano-like device to wear on your wrist is in development by Apple. Can't wait to see this!
