GOING FLASH FREE ON MAC OS X

Adobe Flash Player is known to have allowed malicious code to infect computers, so for several years notices appear on our computer screens telling us to "Update Your Flash Player to Correct Security Problems." Below is a comprehensive article link, *Going Flash-Free on Mac OS X, and How to Cheat When You Need It* in Daring Fireball by John Gruber

dated 4 November 2010 (just to show you how long this problem has existed).

Here are some quotes from the long article by John Gruber, and one needs to read to the end of the article link to see how the problem has evolved and then been resolved.

Selected quotes:

November 2010:

- First, I disabled the Flash Player and old ClickToFlash plugins.
- After logging out and logging back in to my user account, Flash Player is no longer available to Safari or Firefox. This is more or less the state Mac OS X is now shipping in by default [after November 2010].
- I've installed the excellent YouTube5
 Safari extension by Connor McKay.
- Google Chrome offers a workaround Chrome includes its own self-contained Flash Player plugin. So, whenever I hit a page with Flash content I wish to view, I open that page in Chrome. As soon as I'm done watching it, I quit Chrome, which ensures Flash Player isn't left running in the background.



ADD NEW FIELD TO ADDRESS BOOK

Jeff Gamet in *The MacObserver* says you can add a new field in your address book. As shown below, click on "Card" in the Address



Book menu, select "Add Field" and then select whatever new field you desire.

If you would like this added field to apply to all your contacts in Address Book, click on "Edit Template" shown above on the submenu, lower right. Another way to get to the "Edit Template" window is to go to the Address Book Preferences, click "Template" in the menu bar, and from there you can add (or even remove) the field to your entire Address Book in one fell swoop. For example, if in Address Book Preferences you add "birthday" to the template, when you go to add the birthdate to the contact's card and you click "edit," the "birthday" field will appear and you can then add the dates.



<u>iPhoto '11: Copying & Pasting Image Adjustments</u> See Melissa Holt's TMO Quick Tip

Sometimes you take tons of pictures only to discover that they're all wrong in the same way. Maybe the lighting was bad, or maybe you need to tweak the temperature slightly. iPhoto provides a really simple way to adjust one image and then apply those same changes to as many

Products Affected: OS X Lion, OS X Mountain Lion, Preview [This reminder reinforces Larry Fagan's February 2013 presentation.]

When creating documentation, one of my more timeconsuming tasks used to be punching up screen shots with labels, arrows, highlights and whatever. With its ability to mix vector (scalable text, lines and shapes) and bitmap graphics, Adobe's Fireworks was my favorite tool, though it bordered on software overkill. Recently, I was in a rush to get something wrapped up and posted on a deadline and was nowhere near a copy of Fireworks. I nosed around a bit and discovered that Apple's Preview could now do virtually everything I needed.

- 1. Verify the image, webpage, or other visual media you're hoping to capture is fully displayed.
- 2. Simultaneously press the power and home button. You will see a flash and hear a click.
- 3. Check your Photos "Camera Roll" for the correct images and their quality, accuracy, etc.
- 4. Share your images however you'd prefer by selecting the image and pressing the "share" button in the upper right corner of the screen.



LEARNING COMPUTER PROGRAMMING

Computer programming used to be relatively simple. With the BASIC programming language, commands are complete words that make BASIC programs easy to read and understand.

(BASIC stands for Beginner's All Purpose Symbolic Instruction Code.)

Unfortunately, given the choice between readability and machine efficiency, computer scientists have gravitated towards machine efficiency at the expense of readability, which is why the C programming language and its derivatives, Java and Objective-C, have taken over.

Just for demonstration sake, below is a newer language called *LiveCode*, that is based on Apple's old HyperCard and its English –like programming language called HyperTalk. In the current issue of <u>Computoredge.com</u>, Wally Wang shows an example of a simple, easy-to-read instruction for a simple task (LiveCode) versus an equivalent code in Java

Here's the LiveCode command you need to count the number of words in the fifth line of text:

put the number of words in line 5 of the Text

Now here's the equivalent code in Java:

public static int line_word_count(String theText, int
theLine) {
 String [] lines = theText.split("\n");
 if(theLine > lines.length) return 0;
 else return lines[theLine - 1].split(" ").length;
}

Anyone want to guess which program will be easier to write, understand, and modify? Notice that what LiveCode can do in one line of code takes other programming languages several lines of cryptic code to accomplish the same task.

Because LiveCode makes it easy to write and read commands, 25 percent of Scotland's high schools have <u>adopted LiveCode</u> as the language for teaching programming. Now students can learn the basics of programming without getting bogged down with the seemingly arbitrary and cryptic syntax of the C language.
