**LETTER O VERSUS NUMBER 0**

**FREE VIRUS CHECKER**

Last night I went on some unknown supposed game site. As soon as I did, a loud alarm sounded, and a message on the screen said I had a virus on my computer, and there was a place to click on something in order to do something. My computer (MacBook Air on Catalina, OS 10.15) had been checked for a virus in the past by Apple via their screen sharing. I figured there was no virus on my computer — unless that site itself had put one on there. I quickly quit the site. I noticed no problem with the computer.

But I thought I'd ask Apple about it. They no longer have a policy of screen sharing and working with you to check for a virus. However, the helpful Apple person shared with me information about a free program that he uses on his own computer to check for viruses. I did what he said, and so now I'm going to share this with you so that you can use this software if you need it.

Go to Malwarebytes.com. See an M with curved legs for the M in Malware Bytes. At the top of the page there is a free download button. Click there. Download the software

and install it. It says that this is only a free trial, and they are trying to sell you something, but this Apple person said that it still works after the trial period, but if you didn't spend money, you will have to manually check for viruses. Apparently, if you pay, it must automatically check for you. To check for viruses manually, you click in the Finder menu bar at the top of the screen where you see the M with the curved legs. It does a check and then comes to a rest. He said if there were viruses, it would tell you. He also said it gets rid of the virus(es) for you. Apparently I don't have any viruses, just as I thought.

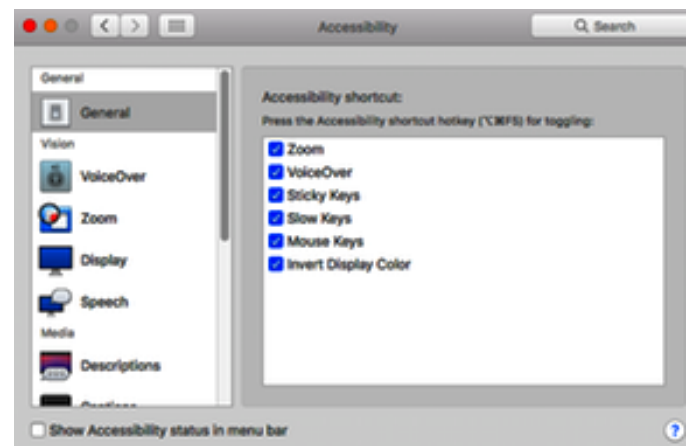
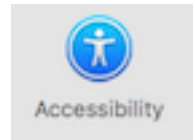


HOW TO USE SCREEN ZOOM ON MAC

To enlarge the screen your watching, go to System preferences > Accessibility and click on Zoom



This Zoom page will show you shortcuts to Zoom using these keystrokes:

Option Command 8 – this will enlarge the page you are looking at.

COVID 19 vs CORVID

During this pandemic I have typed the virus named "Covid 19" numerous times. Often, my various apple devices including my iMac, my iPhone and my iPad try to correct my spelling to "corvid." Corvid refers to birds of the crow family including crows, ravens, bluejays and some other birds I've never heard of: choughs, treepies. I seldom write about corvids.



MISCELLANEOUS iOS TIPS

Battery Power: You can see the *percentage* of the battery remaining on your iPhone and iPad by pulling down the control center. At the top right is the percentage of battery power remaining. On the home screen, the battery power indicator in the top

right of your screen, along with the cell and wi-fi indicators, is approximate.

Cents symbol ¢: To type the cents symbol ¢ on your iOS device, open an application, like Mail or Messages, and begin typing text. When you need the cents symbol, toggle the numeric keyboard till you see the \$ symbol. Hold the \$ symbol down and you will see the cents symbol—slide your finger to it and you will have a ¢ symbol.

To get a degree symbol °, type option 0 (zero).
